All About....April Fools' Day

"The first of April is the day we remember what we are the other 364 days of the year."

(Mark Twain) Ever wonder where April Fools' Day came from? Surprise! The joke's on you. Nobody seems to know its true origins. However, historians do have some clues!

Some historians speculate that April Fools' Day dates back to 1582, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar. In the Julian Calendar, as in the Hindu calendar, the new year began with the spring equinox around April 1. People who were slow to get the news or failed to recognize that the start of the new year had moved to January 1, and continued to celebrate it during the last week of March through April 1, became the butt of jokes and hoaxes and were called "April fools." These pranks included having paper fish placed on their backs and being referred to as "*poisson d'avril*" (April fish), said to symbolize a young, easily caught fish and a gullible person.

Historians have also linked April Fools' Day to festivals such as Hilaria (Latin for *joyful*), which was celebrated in ancient Rome at the end of March by followers of the cult of Cybele. It involved people dressing up in disguises and mocking fellow citizens and even magistrates, and it was said to be inspired by the Egyptian legend of Isis, Osiris and Seth.

There's also speculation that April Fools' Day was tied to the vernal equinox, or first day of spring in the Northern Hemisphere, when Mother Nature fooled people with changing, unpredictable weather.

The tradition of celebrating April Fools' Day has evolved over the years with modern forms of media upping the ante on pranks and tricks. Newspapers, radio, TV stations and websites have all participated in the tradition, making April 1 a day where everyone truly needs to be on their guard.

Although we may never know its true origins, April 1 has come to represent a day of joy and comedy as we move out of the darkness of winter and into the spring.

YOUR BRAIN ON ART

by Susan Magsamen and Ivy Ross

The pleasure we get from art, Susan Magsamen and Ivy Ross report, comes from the same reward system in the brain that lights up for love, sex, food and being out in nature.

In *Your Brain on Art: How the Arts Transform Us* (2023, Neuro Arts), they explain what's going on at the cellular level when we look at, appreciate or create art, including the performing arts.

The arts are strong sensory inputs, Magsamen and Ross say. They "allow us to process emotions, name and express our feelings and even work on accessing the unconscious psyche."

Art biologically changes us, the authors explain, through the release of neurochemicals, hormones and endorphins.

In 2017, a team of psychologists, biologists and linguistics experts from the Max Planck Institute in Germany undertook the study of the physiological effects of poetry.

Through MRIs, they found that the brain responds to poetry in some of the same places where it responds to music—areas that make meaning, interpret reality, help us relax, and facilitate introspection and the gaining of perspective. "Rhyme and rhythm...intensify emotions at a neurochemical level," the authors say. You know you are experiencing this every time you sing along to the radio.

When we draw, serotonin and endorphins are released into our system, making us feel more generous and open. Our brainwaves change when we engage in this activity, and blood flow increases to the frontal brain areas. Moving in sync with others, for instance when dancing or marching, blends neurohormonal, cognitive and perceptual factors to promote bonding with the group.

The arts don't just please us. They are being used to restore mental health. A Boston pediatrician writes prescriptions for joyful engagement, including daily artistic encounters between children and caregivers, based on a child's specific needs. Ashes2Art is a non-profit creative-arts wellness program for first responders and their families. Color therapy reduces anxiety and lifts moods; page 41 tells how.

Susan Magsamen is the founder and director of the International Arts + Mind Lab Center for Applied Neuroaesthetics at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. Ivy Ross is the vice president of design for hardware products at Google and a National Endowment for the Arts grant recipient. She was ninth on Fast Company's list of the 100 Most Creative People in Business in 2019. (Fast Company is an American magazine focused on technology, business and design.)







February 2024 Board Meeting Highlights

February 2, 2024

- Automatic doors were repaired, however, the doors need to be adjusted for proper usage.
- Gutters are being cleaned throughout the community.
- Optimum will begin scheduling and installing fiber to homes once the outside fiber is completed.
- The 2024 Glen Guides have been received from the printer and will be distributed by Block Captain with the February issue of the Gazette.
- The new incumbent cross trainer bike was delivered and installed. We kept the existing bikes since there was enough room for all of them in the gym.
- The issue of Liability Insurance continues to be misunderstood by the club presidents.
- Clarification is necessary to explain the necessity for independent contractors/sole proprietors. A representative from our current insurance company, Hub International, will be scheduled for the next Recreation Council meeting.



Board of Directors

- The Social Club will not be responsible for the July 4th Celebration this year. An advertisement will be prepared for The Gazette requesting volunteers to be involved in the planning and execution of the party. There is a possibility that it can be a Multi-Club function with all members. This will be considered and discussed in the next meeting.
- The rules and applications for the Wood Crafting Club will be revisited. It is vital that the buddy system is
 in place when utilizing power tools. An appointment should be made with Administration so someone is
 always aware of a members' presence.
- The Clubhouse bathroom updates are in the preparation stage. The fixtures are being ordered, and all parts are being finalized. A start date will be determined when all materials are delivered.
- The current porcelain sinks and brass fixtures from the bathrooms will be cleaned and carefully stored in preparation for a possible Facebook Marketplace sale.

February 16, 2024

- There was 6-8 inches of snow last Wednesday. 100 bags of ice melt and 5 tons of salt were used. Each day the community is checked for icing, and ice melt is used as needed.

- Reviewing budgets for roof repairs and replacements.







3 lbs flour 6 eggs (room temp) 1 pkg yeast 1 1/2 tablespoons salt 1/2 cup oil About 1 3/4 cups lukewarm water

CRUST DIRECTIONS

Knead till very smooth Let rise away from draft Cover with tablecloth and blankets for about 3 hours **OR** you could buy 2 fresh pizza doughs for the crust

FILLING INGREDIENTS

3 lbs ricotta 6 eggs

6 oz grated Italian cheese

1 lb dry slicing pepperoni sliced 1/8 inch thick and cut into bite sized pieces

FILLING DIRECTIONS

Mix ingredients together till creamy

BAKING DIRECTIONS

- Cut dough in quarters or cut each pizza dough in half and roll out with rolling pin.
- Place one round dough into oiled pie plate. Spoon in filling.
- Roll out another piece of dough and place on top. Seal VERY well to bottom crust.
- Prick with fork all around top. Repeat for second pie.
- Bake one hour till golden at 325 degree pre-heated oven.
- Brush with beaten egg when it comes out of the oven.
- Turn upside down onto rack after 10 min.
- When completely cool, wrap in foil and put in fridge until ready to eat.






