Creative Corner

All About...Father's Day

"A father is someone you look up to no matter how tall you grow." (Unknown)

Father's Day is a holiday honoring one's father, or relevant father figure, as well as fatherhood, paternal bonds and the influence of fathers in society.

Father's Day is celebrated on various dates across the world, and different regions maintain their own traditions for honoring fatherhood. A customary day for the celebration in many European countries dates to at least 1508. It is usually celebrated on March 19th, as the feast day of Saint Joseph.

The first Father's Day in the United States was observed on June 19, 1910, in the state of Washington, when Sonora Smart Dodd, one of six children raised by a widower, tried to establish a holiday equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents. She went to local churches, the YMCA, shopkeepers and government officials to drum up support for her idea, and she was successful.

Slowly, the holiday spread. In 1916, President Wilson honored the day by using telegraph signals to unfurl a flag in Spokane when he pressed a button in Washington, D.C., and in 1924, President Coolidge urged state governments to observe Father's Day.

Many men, however, continued to disdain the day. As one historian writes, they "scoffed at the holiday's sentimental attempts to domesticate manliness with flowers and gift-giving, or they derided the proliferation of such holidays as a commercial gimmick to sell more products—often paid for by the father himself."

Finally, President Nixon signed a federal proclamation in 1972 declaring the 3rd Sunday in June as Father's Day throughout the United States.

And just in case you were wondering.... The word "dad" was first recorded in 1500 but is most likely significantly older. Researchers believe it is derived from a child's first sounds and is nearly universal. In other languages, the word is *tad* (Welsh), *daid* (Irish), *tata* (Greek), *tete* (Lithuanian) and *tatah* (Sanskrit).

BOOK NOTES

LILAC GIRLS, by Martha Hall Kelly and THE TATTOOIST OF AUSCHWITZ, by Heather Morris

It was a long depressing night that Mary Lee Read had to spend in a train station on her way to Missouri. She told the *New Yorker Magazine* for its December 27, 1947 issue that, "I'll never forget how lonely and desolate and unfriendly that station was, and since then I've always thought of stations as being harbors of heartache."

She took action. She approached her hometown Denver stationmaster and got approval for providing music for the station at Christmas. That was in 1921.

In 1928, Mrs. Read came east to visit her married daughter. She contacted the stationmaster at Grand Central Station and was given the okay to play there that Christmas. She borrowed an organ from Hammond and began a gig that lasted into the late 1950s. She would play year-round in Denver hospitals on a portable Solovox, and return to New York and the electric Orgatron and set of chimes they bought for her, for Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day and Thanksgiving. The Works Progress Administration sent her a choir of employees during the Depression, and she was joined by choral groups during World War II.

Mrs. Read took requests or played what felt right in the moment. On December 7, 1941, "a pall fell over the terminal," John Bell and Maxinne R. Leighton say in their book *Grand Central: Gateway to a Million Lives* (2000), in response to the bombing of Pearl Harbor. Mrs. Read impulsively began playing "The Star-Spangled Banner." It "brought the main concourse to a standstill," the story continues. So many people stopped for the song that the stationmaster had to ask Mrs. Read "not to play anything that would keep commuters from reaching their trains on time." The *New York Times* on October 10, 2014, wrote that "Thereafter, Mrs. Read was known as the only organist in New York who was forbidden to play the National Anthem."

Mary Lee Read gets a brief mention in *Lilac Girls* (2016, Ballantine), historical fiction set during and after World War II. The three based-on-real-life narrators are Caroline, a philanthropist who volunteers at the French Embassy in New York City; Kasia, a Catholic Polish teenager with romantic ideas about the Resistance; and Herta, a struggling German medical student determined to support her family and her country.

The Tattooist of Auschwitz (2018, HarperCollins) is a novel based on the true story of Ludwig Eisenberg, as he told it to author Heather Morris. She originally wrote it up as a screenplay, then turned it into her first novel.

A six-episode TV adaptation began streaming May 2, 2024, on Peacock.

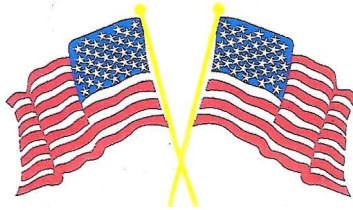

Flag Facts & Myths

Flag Day Friday, Always June 14th Scrutinizing Tales of the Stars & Stripes Facts - Fiction - Myths - Legends



The 247- Year evolution of the Stars & Stripes from thirteen to fifty stars is full of historical detail and legend. There are countless numbers of flag facts and folklore in the evolution of the American Flag. Some of the following information has been received from "Vexillologists" (those who study the history, symbolism and usage of flags)

(FACT) On June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress passed the first flag act "Seeking to promote national pride & unity," Resolved: That the flag of the United States be thirteen stars, and 13 stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen white stars in a blue field, representing a new constellation. The Act did not specify if the stripes would be placed parallel or horizontal, or how many points the stars would contain or where the union of stars would be placed on the flag. President Truman 173 years later, would sign legislation establishing the date of June 14th as "Flag Day "**Why are our flag colors red, white, and blue?** The 13 Red and White Stripes represent the original 13 Colonies. The 7 Red Stripes represent hardness and valor. The 6 White Stripes represent purity and innocence. The Blue represents vigilance, perseverance and justice. The 13 Original stars represent the Original 13 states. **How and why are flags traditionally folded in a triangular form?** It is said the 13 Tri cornered folds when folding the American flag were created to be symbolic of the Tri cornered hats wone by George Washington and the Colonial soldiers during the war for independence. This also made the flag storable in the same hatbox. There are many explanations and stories of why this was done but some read as follows." Red and White Stripes are finally wrapped into the blue, as the light of day vanishes into the darkness of night. **When and how should the flag be displayed?** The American flag (in the military as the colors) should never touch the ground or anything under it. The flag should only be displayed from sunrise to sunset. Do not display the flag in bad weather unless it is an all-weather flag. If you are displaying the flag after sunset, it should have some type of lighting. It does not have to have direct lighting, as long as it is not in complete darkness. **When, why, and how, is the flag flown at half-staff?** In most cases, an American flag flying at half-staff marks one of three observances. The death of a government official, military member, or emergency first responder. A national tragedy, Memorial Day, or another National Day of Remembrance.

What is the correct way for lowering the flag to half-staff? Bring the flag (referred in the military as the colors) up quickly all the way to the top and then slowly bring your flag to about halfway down the flagpole now it's at half-staff. Now when raising the flag to full staff briskly raise from its position to full staff. If you have a bracket on the front of your home for your flag, it usually has a straight hole where you can lower it to half-staff.

Some flag etiquette. Never let the flag touch the ground, do not fly the flag upside down unless there is an emergency. Do not use the flag to carry things in it. Do not use the flag as clothing.

When is the POW-MIA flag required to be flown? Congress dedicated the third Friday of September as national POW-MIAa recognition day. And ordered prominent display of the POW-MIA flags on this day and several other national observances, including Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day and Veteran's Day. The POW-MIA flag is always flown below the American flag either on the same flagpole or a separate flagpole.

Flag Facts & Myths Cont'd.

Who is expected to salute the flag and when? In 2008 and 2009 the National Defense Authorization Act passed the bill for all non-uniformed service members and all veterans in civilian clothes allowing a hand salute during the hoisting and lowering, rolling or folding, of the flag and the playing of Taps. It also allowed a hand salute during the playing of the National Anthem, but you must remain silent not singing. If singing the national anthem or reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, you are not allowed to hand salute you are only allowed to place your right hand over your heart. All citizens at any of the above, placing your right hand over your heart is the proper etiquette. All men should remove any headwear when placing their hand over their heart.

(FACT) How did the Pledge of Allegiance evolve and become part of the flag code? September 9th, 1892, the pledge is introduced in the magazine "The Youths Companion" as part of a program to celebrate Columbus Day in schools across the country. The words were written by Francis Bellamy a Baptist minister and Christian socialist, and read: I pledge allegiance to my flag and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation indivisible with liberty and justice for all. **June 14th, 1923, the National Flag Conference sponsored by the American Legion and Daughters of the American Revolution made changes "My Flag" to the Flag of the United States of America. This was to ensure that recent immigrants had the US flag in mind and not the flag of their nation of origin.** December 22nd, 1942, Congress changes the official manner of delivery to placing the right hand over the heart; the previous stance, one hand extended from the body was too reminiscent of the Nazi salute. Called the "Bellamy Salute" directed that the right hand is extended gracefully, palm upward, toward the flag. June 14th, 1954, President Eisenhower approves the Congressional resolution adding the words "Under God" to the pledge. The Knights of Columbus and other groups, as well as Eisenhower himself, had lobbied for the change.

Who is eligible for a flag draped casket at funeral services? All active military personnel and veterans. Families of veterans who have requested from the military, a flag draped casket, the folding of the flag and the playing of Taps, the following would be done. When the flag is draped over a veteran's casket the blue portion of the flag with the stars will be placed over where the decedent's head and left shoulder will be. If the flag at any time should touch the ground before the folding is completed it will be removed and a new flag replaced to resume the folding. There will be two uniformed members of the veterans' prior branch of service to fold the flag. They are referred to as the tucker and the folder. When folding the flag each of the 13 folds carries its own significant meaning. There have been long time debates over this, however the American Legion and other military organizations believe from the past the following. **1stFold**, Life **2ndFold**, Eternal Life **3rdFold**, In Honor of the Deceased Veteran, **4th-Fold**, Trust in God, **5thFold**, Our Country **6thFold**, Our Allegiance to our Country, **7thFold**, Tribute to Armed Forces **8thFold**, Honor to the Mother **9thFold**, To Womanhood **10thFold**, To the Father **11thFold**, To our Hebrew Citizens, **12thFold**, To our Christian Citizens, **13thFold**, In God we Trust.

How may damaged flags be properly retired (disposed of?) There are military groups such as the VFW that will dispose of your damaged flag in the proper way of burning. However here in Leisure Glen there is a flag disposal box on the outside of the administration building.

(Myth) Burning or desecrating the flag? Burning or desecrating in protest is punishable by arrest, fine and imprisonment. The federal flag Code 4 U.S.C. 4-10 provides uniform guidelines for the display and respect shown to the flag. The flag code does not prescribe any penalties for noncompliance, nor does it include enforcement provisions, rather the Code functions simply as a guide to be voluntarily followed by civilians and civilian groups. Adopted June 22nd, 1942. Some states have adopted laws providing flag desecration penalties, but the Supreme Court has ruled such penalties are in violation of the 1st Amendment rights of free speech, to date a number of efforts to amend the constitution has been unsuccessful.

Flag Facts & Myths Cont'd.

(FACT) Where are the only locations where the flag is flown 24 hours every day and never at half-mast? The 6 American Flags that are flown on the moon.

Who designed the 50-star flag? (FACT) The 50-star flag was designed by a high school student from Ohio. The student submitted his design as a history class project, and sent a facsimile to his congressman, who in turn shared it with President Eisenhower. The student was invited to Washington by the President for the unveiling on July 4th, 1960,

(MYTH) Betsy Ross sewed the first American flag? No, Legend has it that Betsy and George Washington attended the same church and what we then called the city of brotherly love Philadelphia. She was an upholsterer who repaired uniforms, tents, and blankets, in support of the Colonists. There is no primary evidence such as a letter, invoice, or other verifiable documents to verify a request from Washington to fashion a flag. However, there is evidence establishing that Francis Hopkins, a delegate to the Congressional Congress from New Jersey and signatory of the Declaration of Independence, designed the first flag. Hopkins was instrumental in the design of and submitted an invoice for compensation of 1/4 cask of the public wine for his work. The request was never fulfilled.

(MYTH) Washington crossing the Delaware Christmas 1776? The famous painting depicts James Monroe holding the 13th star -13 striped flag as General Washington stands in front of the boat historically peering across the ice choked river. The historical crossing took place on Christmas night 1776. The flag depicted in the painting was not authorized by the Constitutional Congress until the following year June 14, 1777. The original painting was done 75 years later in Germany using art students as models.

(Fact) How did the ceremonial use of the flag at professional sporting events evolve? The first American flag was displayed at a baseball game in 1862 during the Civil War.

(Fact) The Star-Spangled Banner. The only flag in our history that contained 15 stripes. Five Presidents served under this flag: Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison and Monroe. The flag act of 1818 increased the number of stars to 20, reestablished the number of stripes to 13, representing the original colonies, and stated they would be horizontal. The act further stated that one star be added for each state subsequently added to the union, effective on the 4th of July next succeeding the admission. There remained no provision for the size, position or number of points on the flag.

(Myth) Stars representing the Confederate States were removed from the flag at the onset of the civil war? Despite the succession, President Lincoln would purposefully sustain the union on the flag. In fact, two states were added during the conflict, Kansas and West Virginia joined the Union, the latter having seceded from Virginia during the period of war. Some historians theorize that the Civil War period was the beginning of a deep respect for the Red White and Blue.

(Fact) The flag that would famously become known as the Star-Spangled Banner. It is unique in the historical deferred timeline. In June of 1813 Major George Armstead assumed command at Fort McHenry in Baltimore as the war of 1812 raged on. He expressed disappointment that the post lacked a garrison flag and stated ,..."we are ready to defend but have no suitable ensign to display over the Fort. It is my desire to have a flag so large that the British will have no difficulty in seeing it from the distance!" Armstead proceeded to order a flag 30' x 42' from Mary Young Pickersgill a Baltimore flag maker. The smaller storm flag flew over the fort during the 25-hour bombardment. The next day the huge flag was proudly raised above the ramparts as the British fleet departed the harbor. The events gave rise to a poem crafted by Francis Scott Key titled "Defense of Fort McHenry". The poem was eventually set to the melody of a British drinking song and adopted as the National Anthem of the United States by President Hoover 1931. **These are a few of many facts & myths with regards to the flag and the Star-Spangled Banner**

April 2024- Board Meeting Highlights

April 12, 2024

- The Board voted in favor of appointing Bernard (Ben) Taddeo as the replacement for Board Member Fred Finter and he joined today's Board meeting.
- Extensive re-roofing for 23 & 25 Glen Drive. Kitchen area re-roofed for 23 Douglaston Court.
- Lawn mowing and sealing driveways will begin on Monday, April 15th.
- Liquid fertilizer and weed control treatment will be done on Monday, April 22nd.
- Randall Road clean-up is completed.
- Installation of the new pavers in Pear Tree Court are almost complete. New tables, chairs and umbrellas for the area are being investigated.
- The bocce courts have been prepared for the upcoming season.
- Optimum fiber connections are being reviewed to accommodate the appropriate service of the Fire Alarm System throughout the community.
- Updates on utilizing the SCAT (Suffolk County Adult Transportation) bus service have been reviewed with the residents that use the current bus system.
- There have not been any inquiries within the community about the porcelain sinks. Therefore, several possibilities for advertising the sale to outsiders are being considered and reviewed.
- At a recent Recreation Council Meeting, Ed Marczak clarified the acceptability of a club hiring a professional to assist with group instruction. The instructor must follow the protocol for Liability Insurance and possibly Workmen's Compensation Coverage. Individual personal instruction is prohibited on HOA Common Property. The Board voted in favor of approving House Rule #16: Personal Professional Services – Clubs that would like to hire someone to assist with group instruction will need to have Liability Insurance and possibly Workmen's Compensation Coverage, in the same way that insurance is necessary for entertainers and servers for social events. Individual personal instruction is prohibited on HOA Common Property.

- Re-roofed small plywood areas at 23 Amagansett Court, 14/15 Milleridge Court, 7/8 Flanders Court and 19/20 Oakdale Court
- Glass on outdoor tables may be cut to accommodate umbrellas rather than buying new tables for Pear Tree Court.
- Started lawn repairs where needed.
- Sprinklers are being checked for any issues.
- Sinks and hardware are being listed on Craig's List and will be marketed to a consignment store if possible.
- A meeting has been set up with the pool company to discuss summer plans and staffing for the beginning of the season.
- Working on the Budget & Finance reports.
- Started preparing the Budgets for 2024-2025 that will be reviewed at the next budget meeting.
- Bringing in the Auditor for the Year-End Budgets.
- Working with the Broker to review investments with higher interest rates.

Rules for the Leisure Glen Clubhouse & Sports Activities 2024

All Guests entering our Clubhouse or using any of our sport amenities must be accompanied by a Resident.

Sports Facilities: Residents must be with their guest at all times when using any of our sport amenities. **No food or drinks (including alcohol)** are allowed at any of the sport amenities except for water. Food and beverages are designated to only certain areas; Auditorium, Greenery Room and Pear Tree Court. Smoking is prohibited at the sport amenities. Residents and guests participating in unscheduled activities i.e., Bocce, Pickle Ball, Paddle Tennis, Shuffleboard, Ping-Pong and Horseshoes may obtain equipment set aside for non-club use. Some equipment is stored in the closet at the Clubhouse, other equipment is stored at the facility, but you can check with the Recreation Manager as to where and when this equipment may be obtained. **All sports amenities are open from April 1st to October 31st.**

Exercise Room:

Use of the Gym is restricted to **RESIDENTS ONLY**. No guest at all, which include family and friends. There will be a \$50 fine to a resident allowing a non-resident into the gym. Exercise at your own risk. You should be familiar with each gym equipment before using it. The hours are 8am to 10pm.

Paseo:

Please respect our beautiful Paseo. **Residents** as well as **guests, and children** are forbidden to **bicycle ride, roller blade, skateboard or use any scooters**. For Adult motorized scooter exceptions contact the Recreation Manager. There is **No Dog walking** permitted on the paseo.

Pool:

- Residents only are allowed in the pool area with a green wristband. Guests are allowed in the pool area with an orange wristband and are required to be with a resident at all times.
- **Children under the age of 3 years old are prohibited from using the pool.**
- The hours are 10am to 7pm. Please refer to the Pool Rules for more info.
- Each household receives **2** resident wristbands(green), and **4** guest wristbands(orange)
- To obtain/replace wristbands the cost is **\$3.00** each.
- **To use the pool, wristbands must be displayed by the residents when asked for them.**
- Light meals or small snacks, and soft drinks in plastic or aluminum containers are permitted.
- Drinking of alcoholic beverages is **strictly prohibited** at the pool during the permitted swimming hours.

Tennis: Minimum age for use of this facility is 18 years of age. Courts are from 8am – 10pm.

Clubhouse: Residents must accompany their guests at all times while in the Clubhouse. **No** bicycles and motorized scooters* are allowed inside the Clubhouse. **NO** pets inside the clubhouse. **No** smoking is allowed inside and outside of the Clubhouse. (50 feet away from the building)

Bingo: No participation by **children under 6**. For children age 6 and older, a resident must supervise the play, call bingo and collect the prizes.

Billiard Room: Minimum age for use of this facility is 18 years of age.

Copier: 10¢ per copy and is in operation every day of the week in the library at the clubhouse.

***Please Note: Accommodations for disabilities are considered on a case-by-case basis with proper documentation.**

2024 Garbage and Recycling Reminders for Residents

Regular Garbage

- Regular garbage pick-up is on **Mondays and Thursdays**. Place garbage at curbside **by 6:00 a.m.** on pick-up day and **not before 6:00 p.m.** the preceding night (**see Holiday Garbage Pick-up Schedule 2024 for exceptions**).
- All garbage must be placed **in garbage cans with lids** or **tied up securely in heavy duty black plastic garbage bags** or a **\$25 fine** will be issued.
- **White garbage bags placed at the curb will incur a \$25 fine.**
- After pick-up, cans and recycle bins must **not** be stored in any location that is **visible from the street or that may infringe on another resident's patio**, or a **\$25 fine** will be issued.

Alternate Week Recycling*

DO NOT USE PLASTIC BAGS ON RECYCLABLE DAYS

- **Recyclables are scheduled for pick-up on Wednesday mornings.** Place containers at curbside by **6:00 a.m.** on pick-up day and **not before 6:00 p.m.** the preceding night.
- Plastic bottles and containers, metal cans, aluminum containers & foil must be rinsed and clean.



- Plastics marked **PET** **HDPE** are accepted, and recently added **PP** will now be accepted.
- **Recyclables should be placed directly in the container** and not bagged.
- **Shredded paper** should be placed in **brown paper bags only**.
- **All glass** is to go in with your regular garbage.

***One week—Newspapers and Cardboard & One week-plastic bottles, tin/alum. cans, and plastics (as per Recycling Schedule 2024)**

Disposal of Bulk Items

- For pick-up and disposal of bulk items (mattresses, couches, air conditioner units, appliances, small furniture, large cardboard boxes, etc.) **please call Winters Bros. directly @ 631-244-7272 for a scheduled pick-up** of these items.

Yard and Other Waste

- All **yard waste** (tree limbs, pruned shrubs, dead plantings, etc.) will only be picked up by the carting company if it is **black bagged and/or tied**.
- **Only 2 bags or 2 tied bundles per dwelling per collection** will be permitted.
- **Debris generated by contractors or others must be carted away by them or a \$50 fine will be issued.**

Batteries and Fluorescent Light Bulbs

- **Batteries and fluorescent light bulbs** may be disposed of into a receptacle designated for these items located at the south side of the Administration Building.

Hazardous Material

- For **hazardous materials** (paint, paint thinner, motor oil, batteries, empty propane tanks etc. or for televisions and computers) contact the **STOP Program (Stop Throwing Out Pollutants) at 631-286-2828** to inquire about the disposal of these items. The HOA does not provide this service.

Pick-Ups, of course are subject to delays due to weather, equipment breakdown or holidays.

2024 POOL RULES



LIFEGUARDS/POOL ATTENDENTS ARE IN CHARGE OF THE POOL AT ALL TIMES

1. All guests must be accompanied by a Homeowner.
2. Wristbands - Residents (GREEN) and Guests (ORANGE) must have wristbands with them that are visible. Residents receive (2) green wristbands and (4) orange wristbands. To replace a lost wristband, the cost is \$3.00 per band which can be purchased at the Clubhouse from the Recreation Manager.
3. **NO DIVING.**
4. **NO** running, jumping into the pool, or "horseplay" of any kind.
5. Lap lanes are for adults 18 years and over, for swimming and walking. The lane closest to the Pool House is for swimming only.
6. **The Spa is restricted to adult use only (18 years and older). Absolutely no children.**
7. Tops, cover-ups, shirts and footwear are required to and from the Pool area and for entering the Clubhouse.
8. Young children must be accompanied by an adult when entering the pool.
9. **NO blowup arm swimmies, tubes, etc. United States Coastguard approved "Life Jackets" only are permitted.**
10. NO pool toys, kiddie pools or porta-potties.
11. Kickboards and Noodles may be used for floating and swimming purposes only.
12. NO radios or sound systems. Personal earphones are permitted.
13. NO motorized scooters, bicycles or scooters permitted in the pool area. All must be left outside the Pool gate. For adult motorized scooter exceptions, contact the Recreation Manager. Strollers are permitted.
14. NO alcoholic beverages.
15. Small snacks or light meals are permitted.
16. NO glass containers of any kind. Plastic or aluminum containers are permitted.
17. NO large coolers. Small six pack coolers, hard or soft are permitted.
18. Reserving chairs, tables, lounges or umbrellas is not permitted. Furniture should be returned to original location if moved.

SUFFOLK COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT SANITARY CODES

1. Showering is required before entering the Pool or Spa.
2. Individuals with any form of transmittable illness are prohibited from use of the Pool or Spa.
3. **Children under the age of 3 are not permitted in the Pool.**
4. Swim diapers are required for anyone who is incontinent and lacking voluntary control of excretory functions.
5. Pollution of the swimming Pool and Spa is prohibited.
6. Urinating, discharge of fecal matter, expectorating or blowing the nose is prohibited in the Pool or Spa.

The Pool will be open from Saturday, May 25th, through and including Labor Day, Monday, Sept 2nd

GARDEN CORNER



Summer arrives later this month and the Paseo Committee has completed the annual planting of flowers. Of course, before this beautification could occur, our dedicated volunteers spent endless hours weeding and raking the garden beds. Come join us any Thursday morning (weather permitting) at the Clubhouse patio area at 9:30 am.

We are most grateful for the donation of a beautiful dwarf Weeping Ruby Falls Redbud tree to the community. It has been planted at the front entrance of the Clubhouse to be enjoyed by all. Thank you, Linda Schulman, for your outstanding generosity. Along with the planting of annuals, the Garden Club, led by Chris Cole, President, has added a group of colorful ornaments to enhance our public area. We have also added additional hydrangea bushes to the "Hydrangea Garden" located behind the Clubhouse.

The Glen is surrounded by natural beauty. Residents should be aware that not all plants are our friends. "Leaves of three, let them be" is something to be aware of. The Poison Ivy plant has three leaflets. When gardening, be sure to wear gloves and long sleeves for protection. Wash everything afterwards and scrub your hands with cold water and soap. Garden tools should be wiped down with alcohol. If you've ever had it, you know to be careful. Be mindful of what's growing around you when out.

Many people wonder "how do I keep my outside potted plant alive?"

1. Know whether your plant prefers full sun, full shade or a combination of the two.
2. Keep an eye on the temperature. The hotter and dryer it is, the more water your pot will need. Sometimes twice a day is necessary, but if you find when watering, particularly hanging baskets, the water drains right through, try soaking it in a bucket of water for full saturation.
3. Think about the rain. If we are getting a lot of rain, you won't need to water as often.
4. Deadhead your plant. It is the process of trimming off withered blossoms. It looks better and encourages the growth of new blooms.

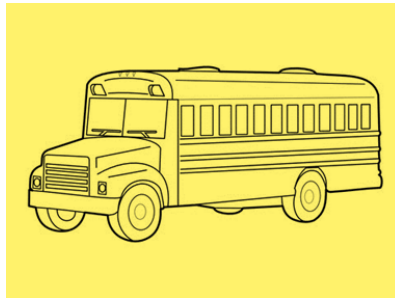


Looking for a few good men to play Regular Poker.

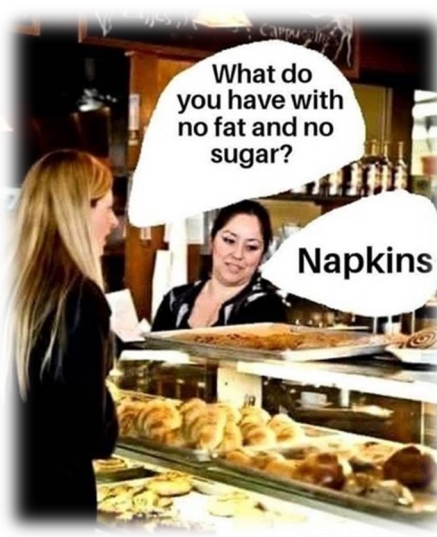
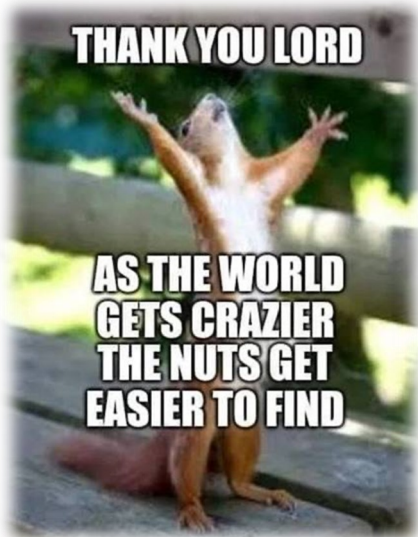

Makes 2 Servings Prep Time 5 minutes Total Time 10 minutes

INGREDIENTS

1 tablespoon honey
1 tablespoon reduced sodium soy sauce
1/4 teaspoon crushed chili flakes (optional)
1 teaspoon fresh ginger minced
2-3 cloves garlic, minced (about 1 tablespoon)
3/4 lb large uncooked shrimp, peeled and de-veined
1 tablespoon olive oil
Salt and ground pepper to taste











PREPARATION

- Whisk honey, soy sauce, chili flakes (if using), ginger and garlic together in a medium bowl.
- In another medium bowl add shrimp and olive oil.
- Season the shrimp with salt and pepper and toss to coat.
- Heat pan over medium high heat.
- Place the shrimp in the pan in an even layer.
- Cook shrimp on one side until nicely seared about 1-2 minutes
- Flip shrimp over and cook for another minute until just cooked but still a little translucent in center.
- Pour in the honey garlic marinade and cook until shrimp is cooked through about one minute more.
- Remove the shrimp from pan so they don't overcook and reduce sauce a little to thicken it.

Serve the shrimp with the reduced sauce over brown rice and veggies.
