

Creative Corner

All About...Thanksgiving Day by Mary J. Collins

Thanksgiving Day is a national holiday in the United States, and Thanksgiving 2024 occurs on Thursday, November 28. More than likely, your **Thanksgiving Day** will be made up of three activities: spending time with family, flipping back and forth between football games and the iconic Macy's parade, and eating an extravagant feast.

Our modern-day celebration of Thanksgiving Day is a blend of fact, fiction, and myths. So, let's take a few minutes to separate fact from fiction and learn a bit more about Thanksgiving as we know and love it, from its origins to how we celebrate it today.

- The first Thanksgiving was celebrated in 1621 as a harvest festival. It included 50 Pilgrims and 90 Wampanoag Indians, and it lasted three days. Turkey wasn't on the menu at the first Thanksgiving. Venison, duck, goose, oysters, lobster, eel, and other fish were likely served, alongside pumpkins and cranberries.
- Today, however, nearly 90 percent of Americans eat the bird—whether roasted, baked or deepfried—on Thanksgiving, according to the National Turkey Federation. Other traditional foods include stuffing, mashed potatoes, cranberry sauce and pumpkin pie.
- Abraham Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a national holiday on October 3, 1863. Sarah Josepha Hale, the woman who wrote "Mary Had a Little Lamb," convinced Lincoln to make Thanksgiving a national holiday after writing letters for 17 years.
- The first Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, held in 1924, featured animals borrowed from the Central Park Zoo instead of the traditional character balloons we know today.
- The tradition of football on Thanksgiving began in 1876 with a game between Yale and Princeton. The first NFL games were played on Thanksgiving in 1920.

BOOK NOTES

BEEP, by Bill Roorbach

Environmental art—maybe most notably Christo's; perhaps most locally Sherry Davis' 12-foot denim sphere that briefly popped up on the DeLea Sod Farm in Riverhead in September 2024—disrupts the view and makes us see familiar places in new ways, even after the installation is removed.

Beep (2024, Algonquin Books) is a bit of literary environmental art, with at least one root in George Orwell's **Animal Farm**.

Beep, a squirrel monkey born in the Costa Rican rainforest, has passed his third rainy season. It is time for him to leave his troupe and set out in the direction of the sunrise, heading for the great beyond in hope of finding a mate and enriching the gene pool.

Maybe he will get as far as the smoking mountain, which every monkey knows about but few have seen with their own eyes and then returned to tell about.

For a time, the journey is through familiar territory, with easy passage through the forest canopy and even across certain busy hot black go-ways, where a kind you-men has placed long, tightly braided blue vines. These are made of non-monkey material and strung somehow tree-to-tree across the go-way. They give monkeys an alternative to the dangerous black lightning vines, for crossing.

This you-men must be a grower. The ones in the roaring, grunting, hissing, farting machines that fill the go-ways below, are goers.

Reaching the end of familiar territory, Beep is confronted with the infernal and monstrous big trail. There is no bluevine here. How will he cross?

He is also curious, and hungry. He observes and tries to make sense of the collection of boxes where you-mens dwell. He notices an adolescent you-men with a supply of the food that helps make monkeys so fond of growers: pineapple!

Very polite, Beep comes up with a strategy for getting some of his favorite fruit.

"One thing everymonkey knows is that goers and growers aren't too bright, and can make no sense of us. I pointed to my mouth: sign was the best way."

With interest and patience on both sides, Beep finds that this you-men is called Inga, and that she is a kindred spirit.

"Capable of learning," Beep notes.

Inga and her family are in Costa Rica on vacation, about to return to their home in New York City.

Beep's quest is about to take him farther than he ever knew it was possible to go.

Bill Roorbach has written other fiction and nonfiction. This story is told in the first person by Beep.



Remembering Veterans Day

11^{th Month}11^{thDay}11^{th Hour}

One hundred and six years ago, on **November 11, 1918**, in a train car in the Compiegne forest in the northwest of France, it was agreed upon at 5 a.m. and signed at the 11th hour, that fighting between the Allied forces and Germany would be ceased, putting an end to World War I.

But World War I, known at the time as the Great War, or "the war to end all wars," did not officially end until seven months later, on **June 28, 1919**. The treaty was signed at the Palace of Versailles in Versailles, France. On **November 11, 1919**, the one-year anniversary of the armistice agreement, President, Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation commemorating November 11 as Armistice Day, known today as Veterans Day. The proclamation read that Armistice Day celebrations would include parades, public meetings and a two-minute suspension of business at 11 a.m.

The proclamation said that Armistice Day would be "filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service, with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us, and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the council of nations."

On **June 4, 1926**, Congress passed a resolution urging state governors to observe Armistice Day with thanksgiving and prayer, and with exercises designed to perpetuate peace through goodwill and mutual understanding between nations. At that time, 27 states had already made November 11 a legal holiday.

More than a decade later, on May 13, 1938, Congress made Armistice Day a federal holiday dedicated to world peace.

Since World War I was not the war to end all wars, and lawmakers believed that veterans from World War II and the Korean War also deserved a day of remembrance, on **June 1**, **1954**, President Eisenhower signed a bill changing the name of Armistice Day to the more inclusive Veterans Day, to thank all who had served the United States of America.

On **October 12,1954**, President Eisenhower published a proclamation in the Federal Register instructing citizens to recognize Veterans Day on November 11. He wrote, "On that day, let us solemnly remember the sacrifices of all those who fought so valiantly to preserve our heritage of freedom, and let us reconsecrate ourselves to the task of promoting an enduring peace so that their efforts shall not have been in vain."

On **June 28, 1968**, 50 years after the armistice agreement, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which moved Veterans Day from its original November 11 date to the fourth Monday in October. The act also declared that Memorial Day, Columbus Day and Washington's Birthday would be observed on Mondays. These dates were meant to take effect in 1971.

On **October 25, 1971**, Veterans Day was federally recognized for the first time on a day other than November 11, and the change was met with much confusion. Many states and most veterans organizations disagreed with the date change and continued to celebrate Veterans Day on November 11, which held historic and patriotic importance.

On **September 20, 1975**, President Gerald Ford signed a bill changing the observation of Veterans Day back to November 11, where it has remained for the past 49 years.


Much has changed since the armistice agreement was signed 106 years ago and the first Armistice Day was observed. But through the past century, despite its different names and dates, the purpose of Veterans Day has remained the same. It is not a day of mourning, but a day of celebration and honor of all veterans.

Let us all take a moment on this Veterans Day to honor those special people who have done something extraordinary so that we may all enjoy the freedom we treasure today. Standing for two minutes in silence at 11 a.m. on November 11th, facing the flag (if you have one), is still traditionally done.

The flag is not flown at half-staff on Veterans Day, per Military.com. Flying the flag at half-staff would have to be approved by the President or by the governor of a state.





The New York Botanical Gardens suggests the following November plant maintenance.

- 1. Continue to thoroughly water trees, shrubs, and planting beds until the ground freezes.
- 2. If you haven't already, cut back perennial to 4-5 inches, but leave ornamental grasses to provide winter interest until spring.
- 3. Keep weeding to remove as many as possible. Then there will be fewer to contend with when spring arrives. Weeds are hardy and will continue to grow and spread into late fall.
- 4. Provide burlap windbreakers for boxwood and broad-leaved evergreens to protect branches from breaking under the weight of heavy, wet snow or ice.
- 5. Give houseplants as much light as possible as lower light days begin.
- 6. Provide houseplants with humidity; mist often.
- 7. Begin to increase the time between watering, but do not cut back on the amount of water.
